What's inside?

Dedications, installations, ordinations, commissions, confirmations, excommunications, farewells, thanksgivings and MUCH MORE!! 65 rites and services

HOLY BAPTISM II

Service of Baptism was not ordinarily a part of the Sunday liturgy Holy Baptism II follows more closely to Luther's order

Features of Holy Baptism II

Confessions of Sin omitted (assuming it would likely happen in another part of the service) Luther's Flood Prayer The Apostles' Creed (baptismal creed) Baptismal Garment Baptismal Candle

Suggestion: Consider baptismal rite in the middle of the service (after sermon, baptismal hymn, rite; follows order of Easter Vigil)

CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE (2 rites)

Includes the rite found in the front of CW, BUT include the marriage candle and an alternate with no congregational participating except for Lord's Prayer

CHRISTIAN FUNERAL (2 rites)

Rite 1 same as CW, BUT includes the pall, paschal candle, and processional.

Rite 2: less participation, includes alleluia verse, and THREE PAGES of alternate prayers.

Note: there's a short form of Rite 2 in CW: Pastor's Companion

Farewell to Alleluia

Suggestion: Instead of PICARDY or FORTUNATUS NEW try: LAUDA ANIMAN (CWS #753 Father, God of Grace You New Us)

Ash Wednesday — Imposition of Ashes

The Imposition of Ashes has been very well received in many WELS congregations in the past 10 years.

Try some "moving music" for the rite

Sign Us with Ashes — Tony Alonso, GIA 7587

CWOS Unique — Psalm 130

DON'T THINK YOU HAVE TO GET CREATIVE WITH LITURGICAL SONGS!!

Palm Sunday — Procession with Palms

CWOS Unique — Psalm 118 You don't have to sing/chant everything.

The Triduum

There have been many local "traditions" that accumulated over many years. If you have not done the services simply as they are offered, try it

Think ahead and begin to "introduce" the services during Lent. Every week send out/hand out an explanation to the services. Talk them up in your weekly announcements and Bible classes.

Maundy Thursday

One of the more ancient forms of public confession; very familiar throughout Christendom.

The stripping of the altar will take some logistical forethought.

CWOS Unique — Psalm 88 (2 settings)

Good Friday

What, technically, it Tenebrae?

Historically, no Sacrament.



Service of the Cross

Remember, you don't have to sing/chant everything. In this case, responsive speaking is quite fitting.

Service of Darkness

Again, speak some, sing some. Less is more.

Easter Vigil

Getting ready: candles and fire

YOU DON'T NEED TO CHANT EVERYTHING

Each of the lessons are followed usually by a psalm, The Song of Moses, and the First Song of Isaiah. Cf. last page for additional suggestions for psalms and songs.






Psalm 88 (Stripping of the Alar) Two settings for choir/cantor Setting 2 uses first line from "What Wondrous Love" as refrain
