ABOUT THE SERVICE

Worship Focus

Forty days and forty nights, the rain poured down and the flood waters rose. God drowned the ancient world in a breath-taking act of liquid judgment. Forty days and forty nights, the Son of God presented himself to his disciples alive and exceedingly well after drowning sin in a flood of blood and swallowing up death in his resurrected body. Now the forty days were at an end. After promising his disciples a pouring-out of the Spirit and entrusting to them the keys to the Kingdom, Jesus—in one final, saving act of his earthly ministry—ascended into heaven. The clouds that hide Jesus from our sight cannot cast a shadow on our Ascension joy tonight: "God has ascended amid shouts of joy, the LORD amid the sounding of trumpets" (Psalm 47).

Tonight's Magnificat

Most scholars agree that Martin Luther created a setting of the Song of Mary (*Magnificat*) to be sung in the Vesper services of the Lutheran Church. The publication date is 1533, and the setting appeared in a hymnal published in Wittenberg. Luther modified a Gregorian chant known as the TONUS PEREGRINUS (the ninth or "wandering" tone) to accompany the text from Luke's Gospel. The setting with its harmony (likely also by Luther) is preserved in *Luther's Works*, American Edition, Vol. 53, pp. 178-179.

Festival Song of Simeon

With a unique plan created by the service designer, the conference planning committee commissioned Dr. Kenneth T. Kosche to prepare a setting of the Song of Simeon (*Nunc Dimittis*), long associated with Vespers, which combined the *Christian Worship* setting of the canticle with Martin Schalling's hymn text, "Lord, Let at Last Your Angels Come" and its tune, HERZLICH LIEB HAB ICH DICH.

A Hymn of Glory Let Us Sing

In 2008 Jeffrey Blersch composed a setting of the Easter text, "Now All the Vault of Heaven Resounds" with its tune, LASST UNS ERFREUEN (Concordia, 97-7293). Desiring an expanded setting of the concertato for the six stanzas of the Ascension hymn, "A Hymn of Glory Let Us Sing" (sung to the same tune), the conference planning committee commissioned Dr. Blersch to compose an additional stanza for treble choir which could be added to his 2008 setting.

Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice

The conference planning committee commissioned David Biedenbender to prepare harmonizations for Luther's hymn and its tune, NUN FREUT EUCH, LIEBEN CHRISTEN.






Extinguish candles. Place candles in receptacles when leaving the chapel.

READING

The Ascension of Our Lord

A harmony based of the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke and the Acts of the Apostles

In my former book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and to teach until the day he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen. After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God.

Soon after the resurrection, the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

On one occasion, Jesus said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms."

Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. He told them, "This is what is written: The Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, and repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

On another occasion, while he was eating with them, he gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high." For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit."

Then they gathered around him and asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?"

He said to them: "It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, he lifted up his hands and blessed them. While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight. And he sat at the right hand of God.

They were looking intently up into the sky as he was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them. "Men of Galilee," they said, "why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven."


Then they worshiped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy from the hill called the Mount of Olives, a Sabbath day's walk from the city. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.







Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937)

Based on a text long associated with the Te Deum Laudamus, Salvum Fac Populum Tuum was composed for a 1918 armistice service at the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris. It is a sonic portrayal of the horrors of war and the triumph of victory. So, too, Christ's cosmic struggle against sin, death, and devil was horribly real. His triumph is total.

O Lord, save your people and bless your heritage. Govern them and lift them up for ever.

At the Festival of the Ascension the Paschal Candle is carried from the chancel to symbolize that Jesus did not remain with his Church in bodily form but returned to his heavenly Father's right hand in glory. The recession of the Paschal Candle does not imply that Jesus is no longer present among us, for he promised, "Where two or three come together in my name, there am I among them" (Matthew 18:20). Wherever his Word and Sacraments are, there Jesus is truly present. The recession of the Paschal Candle helps us to remember that Jesus does not himself carry the gospel in Word and Sacraments to the world, but has appointed us to "go and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:20). With Jesus' power and presence, we are indeed witnesses of grace.
