ABOUT THIS SERVICE

WORSHIP FOCUS

The Festival of the Transfiguration of Our Lord is the third and last of the great festivals observed during the Epiphany season. On the mountain Jesus prepared his followers for the long and dreadful journey to the cross. The celebration of this festival at a worship conference (with a glorious closing service hours away) has a different ambiance than it would when it precedes Ash Wednesday in the Christian Year. As we carry out our individual ministries "under the cross," however, it is good for us to be here and remember that our service is always done on behalf of him who is King of kings and Lord of lords.

TODAY'S MUSICAL SETTING

Over the span of six events, the National Worship Conference has often demonstrated how the historic Christian worship rites look and feel when accompanied by musical styles and instruments which are somewhat less traditional than the materials in our hymnals. At some conferences we took an eclectic approach, featuring music from a variety of resources; in 1999 we featured a unified setting of Morning Praise in which all the musical parts were by one composer, Marty Haugen. Many have become familiar with that service in *Christian Worship: New Service Settings*.

Our sources for these less traditional settings invariably have been the Roman Catholic publishers such as Gregorian Institute of America (GIA) and Oregon Catholic Press (OCP), which have an obligation to produce musical settings of the mass for their constituency. GIA alone offers dozens of settings in a variety of styles and for a variety of instruments. Since the Lutheran liturgy is based on the historic mass (Luther saw to that), we have been able to use these musical settings of the Ordinary in our liturgical services. Where some texts were less than what we preferred, GIA has graciously allowed us to make minor changes.

Our plan at this conference has been to feature the songs of the Ordinary from two new settings, Mass for a New World and Mass of Light, both by David Haas. Both settings use the 2010 text of the Mass authorized by the International Commission on English in the Liturgy (ICEL). While none of these

texts contains false doctrine, we sought permission from GIA to change texts in several cases. To our surprise, GIA did not grant permission.

Most of the texts we would have changed will not be noticed by worshipers and were really nothing more than our preferences: e.g., the new mass text returns to "And with your spirit" from "And also with you." The most noticeable change is the new wording of the Gloria: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will." This is actually a return to the traditional Latin text, "Gloria in excelsis Deo et in terra pax hominibus bonae voluntatis," a text many conference participants have sung in choral literature and which is actually being used in one of the conference recitals. We would have preferred the previous text, "Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth," because we believe this translation is closer to the sense of the original Greek, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom his favor rests." The traditional Latin text and its English translation are best understood as "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of [God's] good will."

The WELS Hymnal Project intends to continue to work with these publishers on text issues, anticipating high interest in their settings of the historic Christian rite as we approach a new hymnal.

FAREWELL TO ALLELUIA

The rite for "Farewell to Alleluia" (*Christian Worship: Occasional Services*, p. 146) enables worshipers to catch the symbolism of omitting the alleluias during the season of Lent which begins with Ash Wednesday three days later. CWOS electronic resources include the hymn text set to a variety of hymn tunes.

- To you be the power forever and ever! Amen.



WORDS OF INSTITUTION





LAMB OF GOD — Agnus Dei


