CONCERTO FOR HARPSICHORD IN F MAJOR (BWV 1057)

J. S. Bach (1685-1750)

Allegro

Sometime before 1710 Johann Sebastian Bach first encountered the genre of the Italian solo concerto, which was made popular by Antonio Vivaldi. It is believed that Bach began composing his own concertos around 1721 with the set of six Brandenburg Concertos while he was Court Kapellmeister in Köthen. The *Concerto in F Major*, from a set of six concertos, is scored for two recorders in addition to the harpsichord and the accompanying ensemble. Bach reused the material from his *Brandenburg Concerto No. 4 in G Major* (BWV 1049), transposing the music down a whole step and recasting the original solo violin part for keyboard. The structure of the music remains unchanged in the harpsichord version, but Bach has done much more than simply adapt the solo violin part. He has completely rewritten the part to make it more easily fall under the keyboardist's fingers. The harpsichordist in this version continues to play, where in the Brandenburg Concerto the violinist rests. This makes the textures and figurations of the solo parts a great deal richer.

CONCERTO IN A MAJOR (WQ 168)

C. P. E. Bach (1714-1788)

Allegro

This year marks the 300th anniversary of Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach's birth. He was the second of five sons of J. S. Bach and is considered to be one of the founders of the classical style. He composed in both the baroque and classical periods, making him a transitional composer. During the second half of the eighteenth century the name "Bach" was almost exclusively associated with the initials "C.P.E." Mozart said of him, "He is the father, we are the children." His *Concerto in A Major* is based on sets of manuscript parts of several versions of the concerto. These sets comprise parts for a solo flute concerto (Wq 168), solo cello concerto (Wq 172), or the solo keyboard concerto (Wq 29), which will be performed in this program. It is a wonderfully energetic and attractive work, which is full of vitality and technical demands for the soloist.

SUNRISE MASS Ola Gjeilo b. 1978

with CANTICUM NOVUM

Ola Gjeilo (pronounced Yay-lo) was born in Norway in 1978. He moved to New York, where he earned a master's degree in composition from The Juilliard School of Music. He also studied at the Royal College of Music in London. The *Sunrise Mass* was commissioned in 2007 by several musical groups in Norway, with the world premiere taking place on November 2, 2008, in Oslo. The piece follows the traditional texts of the Latin mass which the composer has overlaid with a second narrative, giving each of the four movements a seemingly unrelated title in English. Gjeilo says of the second narrative, that it has "to do

with the initial idea behind *Sunrise Mass*. I wanted the musical development of the mass to go from the most transparent and spacey, to something completely earthy and grounded; from nebulous and pristine, to more emotional and dramatic, and eventually warm and solid, as a metaphor for human development from child to adult."

PIANO QUINTET IN B-FLAT MAJOR

Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov (1844-1908)

Allegro con brio

Rimsky-Korsakov is generally thought of as a composer of opulent orchestral scores and of grand operas on Russian subjects. So this charming *Quintet for Winds and Piano* comes as the best possible surprise—a reminder that sometimes there are sides to composers that one knows nothing about. In 1876 the Russian Music Society sponsored a chamber music competition for which Rimsky-Korsakov composed this piece. The piece won nothing but was later performed by the St. Petersburg Chamber Music Society, where it gained attention. Rimsky-Korsakov was quick to admit the influence of Beethoven on the opening movement of his quintet. This movement, in sonata form, is marked *Allegro con brio*, a marking that was a particular favorite of the young Beethoven. Listeners may be struck by this movement's occasional echo of themes from the finale of Beethoven's *Symphony No.* 9. The quintet gets off to a jaunty start with winds singing energetically above steady accompaniment from the piano. The second subject is a chorale for winds, during which the listener may sense the influence of Beethoven. After a lengthy development a coda speeds this movement to its close on a grand B-flat from all involved.

ST. PAUL'S SUITE, OP. 29, NO. 2

Gustav Holst (1874-1934)

Jig Ostinato Finale

Gustav Holst had a deep interest in music education, which inspired the *St. Paul's Suite*, the first major result of his teaching at the St. Paul's Girls' School in London, where he served as musical director from 1905 until just before his death. Originally written for strings for the school orchestra, Holst later added wind parts to include an entire orchestra. At one level the suite is a piece of functional music demonstrating Holst's shrewdness in giving every player something interesting to perform and enabling them all to contribute to the richness of the string textures without feeling technically overstretched. At the same time, the movements reflect the breadth of Holst's musical outlook. Defying precedent, the *St. Paul's Suite* starts with a jig, a dance form generally reserved for the finale. The jig, in alternating 6/8 and 9/8 time, is where Holst introduces a contrasting theme and skillfully blends the two themes. The ostinato opens with a figure played by the second violins, which continues throughout the movement. The violas then introduce the principal waltz-tune theme. The finale is an extended transcription of the fourth movement of Holst's *Suite No. 2 for Military Band*, a set of variations on the folksong *The Dargason*. This tune is introduced very softly followed by cellos playing the familiar tune *Greensleeves*. The suite concludes in an exuberant manner combining the two folksongs.

Adrian Smith

Chamber Orchestra Conductor

Adrian Smith is a 2003 graduate of Martin Luther College in New Ulm, MN, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in education. He has served as an elementary school teacher and parish music coordinator for congregations in Peridot, AZ, and Lake Orion, MI.
