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Thoughts as we gather... The second day of February, forty days after Christmas, is the day we remember the presentation of our Lord Jesus in the temple. Though we're a few days early, we are commemorating that event today. Simeon and Anna turn our attention to mission work. The words of Simeon foretell the work our Savior would do, work in which he graciously involves us as his instruments: "a light for revelation to the Gentiles." We follow the lead of the aged Anna, who, after seeing Jesus, spread the word about him.

There is righteousness and forgiveness for us this morning. These gifts come from our Savior, who, even as an infant, fulfilled the law for us and later gave his life as the perfect sacrifice. Our living Lord provides us with renewed strength to share these gifts by proclaiming his grace, which is indeed our light and redemption.

About the service... The order of service today is Divine Service II from *Christian Worship Supplement*. This version of the historic Western Liturgy provides new melodies for some canticles (the general Verse, *Agnus Dei*) and for others it provides metrical versions that can be set to a number of hymn tunes (*Gloria, Sanctus, Nunc Dimittis*). We will also make use of an alternate version of Simeon's Song, which, appropriately, is set to the tune of the hymn "Jerusalem, My Happy Home." For the psalm today, we will try speaking the words of the psalm in conjunction with singing the refrain. And our hymn of the day will be Luther's version of the Simeon's Song set to a new melody.

In his Word and his Sacrament, we see the Lord's salvation today! May his name be praised and his love proclaimed this morning and always.



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OUR PATH OF WORSHIP

^{*} Because Jesus took away the guilt of the world (John 1:29), he authorized his followers to announce his pardon and forgiveness to all who are sorry for their sins. Jesus told his first disciples, "If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven" (John 20:23). Jesus' forgiveness, proclaimed by his servants, "absolves" us, that is, it sets us free from the guilt of our sins.

First Scripture Reading: 1 Samuel 1:21-28

The life and ministry of Samuel foreshadow the life and ministry of our incarnate Lord. Here, Hannah presents Samuel to the LORD at the tabernacle.

When the man Elkanah went up with all his family to offer the annual sacrifice to the LORD and to fulfill his vow, Hannah did not go. She said to her husband, "After the boy is weaned, I will take him and present him before the LORD, and he will live there always."

"Do what seems best to you," Elkanah her husband told her. "Stay here until you have weaned him; only may the LORD make good his word." So the woman stayed at home and nursed her son until she had weaned him.

After he was weaned, she took the boy with her, young as he was, along with a three -year-old bull, an ephah of flour and a skin of wine, and brought him to the house of the LORD at Shiloh. When they had slaughtered the bull, they brought the boy to Eli, and she said to him, "As surely as you live, my lord, I am the woman who stood here beside you praying to the LORD. I prayed for this child, and the LORD has granted me what I asked of him. So now I give him to the LORD. For his whole life he will be given over to the LORD." And he worshiped the LORD there.

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Psalm of the Day: Psalm 84

This psalm speaks of the blessedness of being in the LORD's house. Here the living God meets his people with his incomparable gifts. What a blessing not only to be served by the LORD, but also to be his instrument in bringing his gifts to people! **Today we will sing the refrain at the beginning of the psalm and where it is noted, and we will <u>speak</u> the words of the entire psalm together.**

Second Scripture Reading: Hebrews 2:14-18

Jesus shared our humanity. Therefore, he knows human suffering and temptation. He can help us when we are tempted, and he has delivered us from sin and death.

Since the children have flesh and blood, he too shared in their humanity so that by his death he might destroy him who holds the power of death—that is, the devil—and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of death. For surely it is not angels he helps, but Abraham's descendants. For this reason he had to be made like his brothers in every way, in order that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in service to God, and that he might make atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted.

Alleluia Verse: Romans 10:17

A Christian custom is to sing "Alleluia" (which means "Praise the LORD") before hearing the Gospel reading. We singi Alleluia, along with a Bible verse that reminds us of the power of God's Word.



Please stand as we hear the Gospel reading—a customary way of showing special reverence to our Savior. We also speak words of acclamation to Christ, our King, who is here with us in his Word.

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Gospel of the Day: Luke 2:22-40

M: The Holy Gospel, according to Saint Luke, chapter two.

C: Glory be to you, O Lord!

Jesus is presented in the temple. Simeon and Anna praise their long-expected Savior.

When the time of their purification according to the Law of Moses had been completed, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord"), and to offer a sacrifice in keeping with what is said in the Law of the Lord: "a pair of doves or two young pigeons."

Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Christ. Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:

"Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you now dismiss your servant in peace.For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

The child's father and mother marveled at what was said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too."

There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was very old; she had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped night and day, fasting and praying. Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem.

When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. And the child grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was upon him.

The Nicene Creed

With Christians around the world and in ages past, we confess our faith in the true God. Today we note particularly how Jesus, the eternal Son of God, "shared our humanity" to save us.

We believe in one holy Christian and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

^{*} In this song we praise God, who is present with us in his Supper. The song echoes the angels that the prophet Isaiah saw around God's throne (Isaiah 6:1-3). The angels sang because they were in the presence of God. We, too, sing because we are in the presence of God: Jesus is really present in his body and blood, which we receive in Holy Communion. The song also reminds us of the people who hailed Jesus as king when he entered Jerusalem to die (Matthew 21:9). They sang "Hosanna," which means, "Lord, save us!" Our Lord does save us through his sacrificial death. (This song is sometimes known as the Sanctus, its first word in Latin.)

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Prayer of Thanksgiving

M: All glory and splendor, thanks and praise are yours, O Lord, heavenly Father.

You pierced the gloomy darkness of sin and unbelief with the brilliant light of your Son.

You guided the Magi to worship the Christ

Refresh our faith, and help us to reflect his truth and grace to the world. We ask this that you may receive endless honor, glory, and praise from every tribe and language and people and nation.

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Further notes on the service and worship folder:

A distinguishing feature in Divine Service II is the Prayer of Thanksgiving (sometimes called the Eucharistic Prayer). Luther excised this section of the Liturgy because it had become polluted by numerous prayers to the saints and other false teaching. In recent years, however, the Prayer of Thanksgiving has been restored by many Lutherans in a shorter and doctrinally sound form. The chief benefit of the Prayer of Thanksgiving is that it gives worshipers an additional opportunity to remember the saving work of our Savior and to thank him for it—a fitting part of our preparation for the Sacrament. It also serves as a short and powerful summary of our Lord's work that can speak the gospel to visiting guests.

In addition to the general Prayer of Thanksgiving printed in Divine Service II, **prayers** for each season are offered on the electronic version of CWS (look for the RTF file "Thank Pr" in the "Liturgy RTF" folder). Today we are praying the Prayer of Thanksgiving for the Epiphany season.
