First Reading

Exodus 24:1-11

Israel's leaders experience fellowship with God

¹ Then the LORD said to Moses, “Come up to the LORD, you and Aaron, Nadab and Abihu, and seventy of the elders of Israel. You are to worship at a distance,² but Moses alone is to approach the LORD; the others must not come near. And the people may not come up with him.”

³ When Moses went and told the people all the LORD’s words and laws, they responded with one voice, “Everything the LORD has said we will do.”⁴ Moses then wrote down everything the LORD had said.

He got up early the next morning and built an altar at the foot of the mountain and set up twelve stone pillars representing the twelve tribes of Israel.⁵ Then he sent young Israelite men, and they offered burnt offerings and sacrificed young bulls as fellowship offerings to the LORD.⁶ Moses took half of the blood and put it in bowls, and the other half he splashed against the altar.⁷ Then he took the Book of the Covenant and read it to the people. They responded, “We will do everything the LORD has said; we will obey.”

⁸ Moses then took the blood, sprinkled it on the people and said, “This is the blood of the covenant that the LORD has made with you in accordance with all these words.”

⁹ Moses and Aaron, Nadab and Abihu, and the seventy elders of Israel went up¹⁰ and saw the God of Israel. Under his feet was something like a pavement made of lapis lazuli, as bright blue as the sky.¹¹ But God did not raise his hand against these leaders of the Israelites; they saw God, and they ate and drank. NIV



Crowned with Blessing—in our past history

Our first anniversary service, held on February 2, coincided with the first service held by Crown of Life congregation on February 1, 1970. We welcomed Pastor Michael Helwig as our guest preacher, who served our congregation from 2003 to 2018, and now teaches religion at Lakeside Lutheran High School in Lake Mills, Wisconsin. We were also honored to welcome the Seminary Chorus from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary in Mequon as our guest choir.

Crowned with Blessing—in our present partnerships

Coronavirus concerns postponed our original plans for this second anniversary celebration, originally scheduled for the afternoon of May 31 (Pentecost Day), now rescheduled for our three regular services this weekend. This second service focuses on the blessings of fellowship we enjoy in our church body, the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS). Our guest preacher is Pastor Donn Dobberstein, WELS Director of Discipleship. Pastor Dobberstein was also our church's consultant in the WELS Self-Assessment and Adjustment program in 2018. We also welcome Pastor Bryan Gerlach, WELS Director of Worship, as our guest organist, and several guest instrumentalists from area WELS congregations.

Our final 50th anniversary service will encourage us to look ahead to the next phase of our history with a mission mindset. This service coincides with three events from Crown of Life's history that all occurred on December 1: the first exploratory meeting (1969), the adoption of the church's constitution (1970), and the dedication of the first church sanctuary (1975). Our guest preacher will be Pastor Greg Sitzman, a "son" of Crown of Life congregation who serves Emmanuel Redeemer Lutheran Church in Yale, Michigan. Branches Band will provide the music for this service.
