Præludium in E. Vincent Lübeck, 1654-1740

This relatively unknown composer was active between two giants of the Lutheran baroque period: Dietrich Buxtehude and J.S. Bach. Some musicologists have noted parallels between the structure of a præludium and theories of rhetoric – the construction of an effective speech. Johann Mattheson (1739) used categories described by a Roman orator, Cicero (d. 43 BC), and adapted them to music. A speech's introduction and a præludium's opening are both designed to grab the listener's attention. The musical style is improvisatory, stylus phantasticus. Mattheson offered this description:

"This style is the most free and unrestrained manner of composing and playing that one can imagine, for one hits first upon this idea and then upon that one. All kinds of otherwise unusual progressions, hidden ornaments, ingenious turns and embellishments are brought forth without actual observation of the measure and the key; now swift, now hesitating, now in one voice, now in many voices, now for a while behind the beat, without measure of sound, but not without the intent to please, to overtake and to astonish."

While the introduction is improvisatory, the presentation of "facts, supporting arguments and conclusion" – to use rhetorical terms – all follow stricter musical forms such as fugue or imitation.

Blessed Jesus, at Your Word (CW 221) Paul Manz, 1919-2009

This setting features some of the softest sounds on the organ. The hands play a shimmering accompaniment on the "strings" while the feet play a decorated version of the hymn tune. This hymn text and the next are frequently used as opening hymns, invitations to the blessings of worship.

Lord Jesus Christ, Be Present Now (CW 230, BWV 655) I.S. Bach, 1685-1750 In Bach's day the hymn on which the music is based was sung in most German churches each Sunday as the usual pulpit hymn before the sermon. Unusual in this composition is that the hymn tune doesn't appear until the last third of the piece – even though hinted at earlier. One hint is the following figure which occurs six times in the base line in five different keys. It might correspond to the first words of the hymn, roughly translated to fit the musical figure.

Father, We Praise You (CW 581) Robert Hobby, b. 1962

The hymn is an optional standard beginning for Morning Praise (CW page 45). Can you hear in the composer's setting hints of a sunrise? Today's service includes three selections by Hobby. All feature readily identifiable melodies to familiar hymns, a comfortable contrast to some of the less familiar repertoire.

Fanfare for Organ Richard Proulx, 1937-2010

Proulx (pronounced Pru) possessed a rare combination of talents as composer, conductor, music editor, and organist. He composed congregational music in every form, sacred and secular choral works, song cycles, two operas, and instrumental and organ music. His organ arrangement of Veni Creator (CW 178) was featured in the 1997 film The Devil's Own, starring Brad Pitt and Harrison Ford.

Amazing Grace (CW 379) Robert Hobby

The setting begins with the organ imitating the sound of bagpipes, a sound that has become a part of recent American cultural memory. YouTube (amazing grace bagpipes 9-11) provides numerous renditions in memory of those who lost their lives in the terrorist attack.

Concerto in A Minor, mvt. 1 (BWV 593) Antonio Vivaldi, 1678-1741; transcribed by J.S. Bach Bach took a piece for many instruments and reworked it for one instrument. The original composition (RV 522) was for two violins and a chamber ensemble.

The ringing of the bells signals the start of worship.

The congregation remains seated during three short preludes to the opening hymn.



Our Guest Preacher and Organist

James Tiefel has served on the faculty of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary since 1985. Professor Tiefel is a member of the seminary's Practical Theology department and teaches courses in worship and preaching. As the school's dean of chapel he is responsible for campus worship and directs the Seminary Chorus and also serves as director of student field services. From 1987 to 2013 he served as a member of the Commission on Worship and is presently serving on the Executive Committee of the new hymnal project. Besides his work for the seminary and synod, Professor Tiefel is pulpit assistant and minister of music of Grace Lutheran Church, Milwaukee. He and his wife Brenda live on the seminary campus in Mequon.

Before **Bryan Gerlach** graduated from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, he studied music at the Wisconsin Conservatory of Music and the University of Minnesota. At Concordia University (River Forest, Illinois) he earned a Master of Church Music degree in 1982. His organ teachers have included Bethel Zabell, Roger Sherman, Heinrich Fleischer, and Herbert Gotsch. After serving as pastor at congregations in El Paso, TX, and Citrus Heights, CA, he was called to be the Commission on Worship's first director in 1995. He also serves as coordinator for the Congregation and Ministry Support Group and is on the Executive Committee of the new hymnal project. He is a regular organist at two churches: Grace, Milwaukee, and Christ the Lord, Brookfield, Wisconsin. Bryan and his wife Jackie live in Elm Grove, Wisconsin.
